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Recipe For Happiness

This is the true joy in life: the being used for a purpose recognized by yourself as a mighty one; the being a force of Nature instead of a feverish, selfish little clod of ailments and grievances complaining that the world will not devote itself to making you happy. I am of the opinion that my life belongs to the whole community, and as long as I live, it is my privilege to do for it whatever I can. I want to be thoroughly used up when I die, for the harder I work the more I live. I rejoice in life for its own sake. Life is no 'brief' candle to me. It is sort of a splendid torch which I have got hold of for the moment, and I want to make it burn as brightly as possible before handing it on to future generations.

It is a basic human desire as expressed in our constitution that we pursue happiness. Most of us have felt the frustration of not being able to be happy. When the happiness you had expected in life, seems to be just out of your reach. At those times it is common to ask, "Why is this happening to me? What am I doing wrong? Is something wrong with me?" I don't think that it is that happiness is eluding you or purposely avoiding you. The problem is more than likely, where you are looking and how you are looking for it. Although Buddhism is a path to discover who you are. The answer may not be exactly what you expect. Maybe the you, you are searching for isn't the you, you expect to find.

When Shakyamuni Buddha began his search, he had received almost every material pleasure, a human being living at that time could imagine. His father had made certain that he would live a life of luxury. He had palaces for each season. He was surrounded by the most aesthetically pleasing articles available. It was said that he was blessed with great intelligence, physical strength, good looks. His wife was said to have been beautiful and intelligent. He was blessed with a son. Yet happiness still eluded him. How many of you feel that if you had wealth, health and a happy family, you would have happiness? I doubt that Shakyamuni Buddha had a cell phone, cable T.V, the internet, microwave ovens or fast food. Materially each of us reading this is probably better off than he was.

In our present age, we are constantly bombarded with media about celebrities. These are individuals who have wealth, seemingly good health, fame and usually physical beauty. Yet, we are always hearing about their stints in various rehabilitation facilities. Even these facilities are described as being luxurious, where all their physical needs are met. Why have they not been able to find happiness?

This quote that I began is written by George Bernard Shaw. Probably his best known work is "Pygmalion", which was made into the musical "My Fair Lady". He was a self taught writer and devout socialist. He lived to the age of 94. He died from injuries sustained in a fall from a ladder while working on his property. I was sent the above quote in an email. The quote is a compilation of various writings attributed to Shaw. I believe that the essence of this quote is in the idea that happiness in life can be found in service to the community.

In this quote he writes that “life is no ‘brief’ candle to me.” This particular line struck a harmonious chord within me. This past July, I turned 50. Before my birthday I had told Carmela that when I was in my twenties, I had three very good friends that I had discussed the subject of how long we would probably live. In our discussions we had talked about how we have had the privilege of living full and exciting lives. As a result we were probably burning through our lives at a higher rate than normal and that we would probably not live much longer than fifty. Each of these friends had encouraged me in trying to work for the sake of the community. I have written about the guidance I had received from Rev. Russell Hamada and Rev. Dennis Yoshikawa about the importance of our lives within the Sangha. While I was at the University of Utah, my friend who would become, Senator Pete Suazo, had encouraged me to work for the sake of equality and the community here in Utah. All three of my friends have died. Each before the age of fifty. Carmela had told me that since I didn’t die before fifty as I had somewhat expected. My premonitions of death at fifty, wasn’t about a physical death, but a psychological death. I believe that she was right. Each of us are being born and dying daily. We place limitations upon who and what we are. We create our own realities of happiness and unhappiness, both are waiting for us. If we create a world in which our focus is “me, me, me.” As Shaw has described, “a feverish, selfish little clod of ailments and grievances complaining that the world will not devote itself to making you happy.” This happiness will always be just out of reach. Our bonno (greed, anger, ignorance) is a like a hungry ghost, never satisfied.

Yet we can create a world in which we work for the betterment of all. Where our happiness can be found in the happiness of others. There is a quote in my minister’s seiten that I often read, “Our life is filled with warmth in sharing life with others. It is a simple truth to learn, but a difficult practice to fully realize. In personal life, it means to act by placing ourselves in the position of another, in community life, it means to give service with joy and gratitude for the betterment of all. The practice of making others happy is based upon the clear understanding of life, which is oneness. In deep gratitude, let us realize this oneness of all life, the heart of which is compassion.” This seems to be a recipe for happiness in this life.

I hope that each of you can find happiness within this world.

The Eitaikyo Service is a memorial service for people who have handed down the teaching of the Nembutsu to us. In the glossary in our temple's service book, "Eitaikyo" is defined as a "perpetual memorial service." This is a general memorial service for all departed members of the temple. The word Eitaikyo actually means "perpetual sutra." Eitai means "perpetual" and Kyo means "sutra," or "teaching of Buddha."
